Sermon/Reflection:
It should not take us by surprise when Jesus,
during his Sermon on the Mount, mentions the
adversity faced by God’s people. Living
faithfully seldom results in a comfortable life.
We struggle spiritually and have dark times. We
grieve. We face injustice. We are called to the
difficult tasks of forgiving, serving others, and
pursuing reconciliation. And often we are called
to live out our faith in a world that is hostile
to the Gospel of Christ.
And in the midst of these struggles of the
saints, Jesus proclaims blessing. The hardships
of our world are an effect of sin. But God’s
people do not encounter the struggle alone.
Through God’s presence with us, we are blessed.
God gives us the Kingdom of Heaven, even when we
are grappling with faith. God consoles us with
hope for the future, even as we grieve losses and
withstand hard times.
God has come to us in Christ. He has shown us
the depth of God’s love by going to the cross and
dying, taking all of our sin onto himself there.
And he sticks with us: he has brought us through
the death of our sinful selves into risen life
with him, into a sainthood that begins in this
life, and continues on into fulfillment before
the throne of the Lamb. One day, we will join
our sisters and brothers of every time and place,
together, in the midst of perfect love and joy.
Until that day, Christ still accompanies us
here, present with us in bread and cup and
baptismal water, in the living Word of the
Gospel, and in his saints. May we know the
double blessing of not only trusting in Christ’s
presence with us, but also showing up to be
Christ’s presence, to share his loving company
with others who are facing hardship. And may our

actions, our words, and our whole lives point
toward the unending blessing of our God who abides
with us. Amen.

multitudes you have called by name and gather to
yourself. Comfort us as we grieve those who have
died in the past year since last All Saints Sunday
and who are with the Lord forever – (*Erika Flath,*
Lesley Sherstobitoff, and Ida Muller). In faith,
may we join with them in ceaseless praise. Hear
us, O God.

So, where did October go, anyway? As we move into November this Sunday morning, this is a reminder that Pastor Melissa’s last service with us will be November 15. She had announced her resignation to the congregations at the September 27th service, and I know we all will miss her.

Bishop’s Assistant, Dennis Serfas, has been very helpful in providing some names of pastors who are willing to serve our parish, at least on a part-time basis. So far we have reached out to three of them, and have made arrangements for worship and Communion at all four Advent services as well as one service in early January. We’ll supply more detailed introductions in upcoming bulletins, but as a head-start, Pastor Bruce Ehlert will join us on November 29 and December 6. Many of our congregation may remember Pastor Bruce from his time at Redeemer in Saskatoon (1999-2010). Since 2010 he has served at Mount Olivet near Edmonton before he and his wife Susan recently returned to Saskatoon to be close to their grandchildren.

We continue to be watchful – daily – of the current pandemic resurgence, and we are aware that the wrong combination of outbreaks around Saskatoon and west could force us to cancel worship, with only short notice. FIRST READING: REVELATION 7:9-17

⁹ After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands.

¹⁰ They cried out in a loud voice, saying,
“Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!”

¹¹ And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, ¹² singing,
“Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen.”

¹³ Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, “Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?” ¹⁴ I said to him, “Sir, you are the one that knows.” Then he said to me, “These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

¹⁵ For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.

¹⁶ They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat;

¹⁷ for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.”

SECOND READING: 1 JOHN 3:1-3

¹ See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ² Beloved, we are God’s children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³ And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 5:1-12

⁵ When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ² Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:

³ “Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

⁴ “Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

⁵ “Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

⁶ “Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

⁷ “Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

⁸ “Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

⁹ “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

¹⁰ “Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness’ sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

¹¹ “Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹² Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.
